

Music

Music plays a vital part in the education of pupils at Doddinghurst Infant School, giving the children exciting aesthetic and creative experiences. Starting our children on a lifelong journey of love and appreciation for music.

Intent

Our intent is to ensure that all children:

- Produce creative work In a variety of forms; exploring ideas and recording experiences.
- Become proficient in singing, composing and performing their own and others pieces of music.
- Use developing musical vocabulary to discuss theirs and others work.
- Know about great artists, musicians, composers, as well as understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms.

Music is used in a cross curricular way, accompanying all other subjects, and as a major part of our; assemblies, performances and special celebrations. Such as celebrating iconic music through the decades as part of Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Where we created class dances and performed in front of the whole school.

We use songs in all areas of learning e.g. days of the week, number bonds song, to support mathematical learning and vocabulary. The continents song to recall the continents within Geography. Mrs Palmer believes that there is a song for every occasion, and for every area of learning!

Singing

All year groups have one song practice a week enabling them to experience singing as a communal activity (EYFS start this after the first half term).

These assemblies are a chance for children to learn a variety of songs linked to current themes in the academic year i.e. Harvest, Christmas, Mother's Day; as well as, some traditional hymns. There is also a variety of songs sung throughout our Christmas performances, as a whole school, class, small group and solo performances.

Choir

Children who find that they particularly enjoy these practices can join the school choir.



We have been privileged to support local community events with our singing and have performed at:

- Remembrance services at All Saints Church.
- The Richard Stonley Festival in our village.

Music Lessons

Our children have music sessions, in which they learn discrete musical skills as well as singing, composition and a general passion for this area of learning.

Our lessons are based on Development Matters and the National Curriculum requirements, and we have access to a fantastic interactive teaching resource which is called Charanga.



Recordings are made using iPads. This enables the children to use technology purposefully in an interactive manner to access and compliment their learning, using technology to record and play their performances for appraisal.

Instrumental Tuition

At present there are opportunities for students to learn the recorder in our recorder club.





Creative Arts Room

We are fortunate to have a creative arts room that is fully equipped with a wide variety of tuned and untuned percussion instruments, this enables children to have hands on access to adapt their performances and experiment fully. Our early years can often be found in their environment with their own instrument creations performing on their outdoor stage.



Please let us know if your child is learning to play an instrument outside of school, as they may like to showcase their talents in one of our celebration assemblies.
