

EYFS UPDATES SWIFTS and WOODPECKERS

What a busy half term we've had in Reception! When the children returned to school they found a caterpillar growing kit, which was a big clue about our new class story—The Very Hungry Caterpillar. We loved reading the story and all agreed the caterpillar was very greedy. The children were very creative and worked collaboratively to make a large life cycle of a butterfly, exploring colours and textures. Using their knowledge of the story, the children created their own story map, then wrote the story sequencing the main events.



Then our attention moved onto to a special event — the King's Coronation. We read The King's Hats and The Queen's Hat, learning new vocabulary linked to the royal family and coronation. As a school, the children participated in a crown parade, performed 'Coronation Day' song as a school and had a royal feast,



finishing up with a live performance from 'Kidz Pop'. We would like to thank Rev Ann and Dagwood Trust for donating a beautiful book mark to each child, to mark the important event. What a fabulous party we had to celebrate a momentous occasion!

We returned our focus to living things and the natural world in our local environment. This time the children



were learning about worms through our books Yucky Worms and Superworm. The children received a letter from a very unhappy worm so they made it their aim to find out as much information as possible about worms and how they are vital to the growth of plants and flowers. The children became budding authors and wrote their own nonfiction books about worms and demonstrated they could read their writing aloud to an impressed audience of Year 2s.

On the final week we were all excited to find our caterpillars had transformed into

In Maths the children explored doubling and sharing. Then moved onto odds and evens, understanding that odd numbers can't be shared equally and even numbers can be shared fairly. The children had great fun, applying their knowledge of odd and even amounts by playing tug of war in the garden with odd and even amounts of players on each team.





beautiful butterflies. We came up with names for them, before releasing them into the wild in our school sensory garden. Each day, we relished the opportunity to get outside, dig for worms and visit the pond area to track the growth of the tadpoles.

YEAR ONE UPDATES CHAFFINCHES and ROBINS

Wow! This half term has flown by—must be all the Bank holiday weeks that we have had. Almost time to be moving on to Year 2! Of course we must start this half-term's round-up with our wonderful coronation

celebrations. We spent a busy week learning facts about the life of King Charles III, including how he grew up , his schooling and what would happen on the day of his coronation. The children did well to remember these facts and to write them; even remembering to use capital letters and full-stops. We extended our Geography knowledge of the countries of the United Kingdom, when we looked at the King's Coronation emblem that was made from the different national flowers—rose, daffodil, thistle and shamrock. We made our own versions, they have turned out beautifully.

There was our whole school celebration. The crown parade was the highlight of the day-they were amazing

and so creative—well done to the mums and dads, aunties, uncles and friends who helped

to create them. For the coronation party we were responsible for making cheese twists—a really easy snack to make and even easier (and tastier) to eat! We really enjoyed singing our coronation song with the whole school and also dancing to great music provided by Miss Broom and her sister.

We started the half term with a story by Julia Donaldson—'The Snail and the Whale'. This was a great way to begin our new whole school theme, 'Location, location, location'. We spent a lot of time focusing on the descriptive language that Julia Donaldson uses to tell us what different settings, or locations, in the story are like. We then used our own adjectives to write descriptive sentences for scenes from the book. We spent a long time learning a simplified version of the story, using actions to help us remember key words like 'next', 'then' and 'finally'. We are wondering how many the children can still remember! We then made the story our own by changing the two main characters that the children used to write a new story.

Our maths learning this half term has been based around shapes—2D flat shapes and 3D solid shapes. We have looked for these shapes in the environment and identified them around us. Then we learnt all the maths vocabulary we needed to describe the properties of these shapes—like sides, vertices, edges and faces.

Forest school has also been fun this term—lots of making! It started with bows and arrows and then on to building dens and shelters, and sawing the wood to hold up the tarpaulin. We also enjoyed some relaxing time in hammocks that we strung up between the trees.

Have a great half term break—fingers crossed for lots of sunshine! See you in June!











YEAR TWO UPDATES SWANS and KINGFISHERS

We have spent the last half of the Spring Term travelling back in time to <u>1912</u> and have been learning about <u>'The Titanic'</u>. We have found out so many interesting facts about the ships tragic maiden voyage. We have discovered that there were 2,224 passengers on board the ship but only 16 lifeboats, and that the boat was built by The White Star Line Shipping Company in Belfast! We will continue to learn more about the journey as we move into the last half of the Summer Term.



At the start of May we continued learning about <u>money</u>. As a year group we completed lots of practical Maths challenges and solved problems involving adding and subtracting different amounts of money. We have also been working very hard to find the properties of <u>2D and 3D shapes</u>. We are looking forward to learning about telling the time after half term.



We had a blast celebrating <u>The King's Coronation</u>; we made flags, crowns and sang songs to mark the historic occasion. We welcomed the band 'Kidz Pop' to the school and danced the afternoon away during a whole school celebration. We hope you all enjoyed watching the videos we uploaded to Seesaw!



We have been extremely busy this half term with <u>sporting competitions</u>. We have taken part in Tennis, 3 Tees Cricket, Quad Kids, multi-skills and football competitions. All children, in every event, did incredibly well, but our cricket team won their competition maintaining an undefeated record for another year!

Congratulations to all the children that took part and represented our school so well!

<u>Science</u> this term has been so much fun! We have been learning about plants and how they grow. We know that for a plant to grow it needs light, air, nutrients and space. We have also Identified and described the basic structure of a variety of common flowering plants, including trees. We will learn more about plants as we move into the last half of the Summer Term.

We all impressed our teachers in <u>English</u> when we told an alternative version of the famous children's story '<u>The Snail and the Whale'</u>. We spent two weeks learning the original story and wrote postcards as well as described characters and settings. Then we worked independently to change the story from its original form, and created our own version. Our teachers thought that it was some of the best writing we have done this year and decided to showcase our work to other local schools.

The Year Two team would like to wish you all a restful and happy half term. We hope that everyone enjoys spending time with their family and friends. We will see you back at school on <u>5th June</u> when we will be entering our final half term at Doddinghurst Infant School!
